HOPE ALIVE GROUP PSYCHOTHERAPY
I LEVEL TRAINING
9th -17th October 2014, Warsaw
with the participation of prof. Philip G. Ney

Intensive 70 hours training in practical and theoretical aspects of group psychotherapy for people experienced by long term trauma resulting from abuse, neglect and child loss.

Hope Alive group therapy presents a unique, integrative and rational psychotherapeutic approach, taking into account the most important, original discoveries in the field of psychotherapy, psychiatry, psychopathology as well as developmental and clinical psychology. It is based on research and vast clinical experience of its founder, prof. Philip Ney. Effectiveness of the program has been confirmed in studies of different categories of patients. Hope Alive has become a discovery for psychotherapists and patients. Hope Alive allows a better understanding of the victims and the perpetrators of neglect and abuse, which is a condition to work effectively with them. It redefines existing approaches to the treatment of trauma and reveals a new perspective in work with deeply damaged people.

Prof. Philip Ney – Canadian psychiatrist, psychologist and psychotherapist, founder of IIPLCARR (currently IHACA). His main interest has been focused on long term trauma for almost fifty years. He conducted scientific research on the causes of child neglect and abuse and its interconnections with child loss (prenatal and perinatal). Philip Ney created a group psychotherapy program dedicated to address the key issues of long term trauma in a complex way: recognition of resistance and defense mechanisms, learning assertiveness and ability to protest, working on guilt, going through mourning, grief and despair, recognition and affirmation of the true self. One of the aims of this psychotherapy program is to recognize key conflicts of abortion survivors and their personality reconstruction after trauma.

Methodology:

The participants go through an intensive, 70 hours training based on self-experience (experiential training) that includes theoretical lectures by Philip Ney and practical workshops of group psychotherapy experience.

Participants:

The training is intended for psychotherapists, psychologists, psychiatrists, doctors (family, gynecologists), counselors involved in the treatment of trauma or facing its consequences in their work, spiritual leaders, persons engaged in preventive and educational activities, midwives and nurses.

Objectives:

1. To provide theoretical and practical knowledge about the program and the process of therapy.
2. Introduction to scientific approach and research results regarding the treatment of trauma resulting from neglect, abuse and child loss.
3. Personal experience of the most important stages of the program.

Prof. Philip Ney – Canadian psychiatrist, psychologist and psychotherapist, founder of IIPLCARR (currently IHACA).

Beata Rusiecka – psychologist, psychotherapist, supervisor, IHACA trainer
